

Jennifer Gibson left the Church in her 20s, hurt and disillusioned. Can we together work to make sure such stories are a thing of the past?

When I first heard Jennifer's story, I was disappointed and sad. I want to share something of her experience with you – my hope and prayer is that you will be moved to act and stand with us as we work to stop this happening again.

I'm 31 and I stopped going to church two years ago.

I grew up as a Christian and was confirmed in my early twenties when I got stuck into a fantastic local church. It was full of wonderful people, serious about God.

Yet, as one of the few "young people" at the church, I gradually felt like there were more and more differences between me and the other church members. I had doubts and questions, yet everyone else had a seemingly secure faith. The church no longer seemed very welcoming. I felt like I was "doing faith" wrong and was being pushed to the fringes.

Lots of the younger people started to taper and leave, and I was the youngest left. I felt judged and like people expected me to have it all together. So in the end I stopped going.

Sadly, I have no doubt that Jennifer's story resonates with many of you – that many of your children, grandchildren or friends have had similar experiences. Perhaps you have yourself.

That's why I'm writing to you today. We want to do all we can to stop the tide of 20s and 30s leaving the Church. But to do this, we need your help.

The figures are stark. Only three in every 100 people in their 20s attend church.

In just two decades, the number of 20-somethings attending church has halved. Just imagine the statistics in another 20 years if we don't act now. Will you give a gift to help change this?

With your help, the Evangelical Alliance's threads initiative can make Jesus known among this generation. You could help young men and women challenge, explore and celebrate the relationship between faith and everyday life, through daily articles on threadsUK.com. threads has been such a help and support in my faith. I came across the website on social media and was immediately encouraged by the articles I read. It's nice to hear from people my own age who are unembarrassed and serious about their faith but who haven't "got it all together" and aren't judgmental about others. It affirms to me that you can be a committed Christian whilst asking the unasked questions.

I miss the community and support of church and to be honest it's meant I don't "practise" my faith or pray as much. Thanks to the **threads** community, however, I now have a peer group of Christians who can walk alongside me on this journey.

Your past generosity has helped *threads* strengthen and support Jennifer in her faith – thank you.

Yet peer-to-peer community and honest, Christ-centred discussion shouldn't be a luxury for young adults, it should be the norm.

So we need your help all the more to launch phase two of *threads*. With your support, we want to bring together 50 church leaders at two pilot training events this year, and equip them with a pack of resources to help them engage young adults in their communities. Your support could help put a stop to the tide of 20s and 30s leaving the Church, so that stories like Jennifer's are the last of their kind.

For these training days and resource packs we need $\varepsilon_{2,500}$. That's a gift of ε_{50} per church leader, to train and equip them to engage the missing generation. And that's just the beginning. We need to raise a total of $\varepsilon_{59,715}$ for threads in 2015-16 in order to carry out these exciting plans.

Our prayer is that, through *threads*, thousands of young adults will rekindle a vibrant faith and take their place in the life of the Church again. Will you help us do this?

With your support, we want to:

- provide peer-to-peer community for 500 young adults this year at 10 threads events
- equip 50 church leaders with the knowledge, skills and resources to engage with 20s and 30s in their congregations and communities
- reach thousands more young adults at five large conferences, to draw them back to faith and to church.

If we don't act now, we risk losing this generation of young adults completely. God cares deeply for every one of His children, and I'm sure you do too. So there's no time to lose.

Please pray and please give a gift to help us reach out to young adults and draw them back into church. Thank you so much for your passion, prayers and provision for this work.
